World Book Day 2024



Blind Date with a Book


Not only are we encouraging reading among the pupils at Cams Hill School, but we are also fostering a love for reading among the staff.






When the Mountain Meets the Moon




Kick by Mitch Johnson




The Mystery of the Clockwork Sparrow By Katherine Woodfine

may now be told.




The Other Side of Truth by Beverly Naidoo

This is the story of 12 year-old Sade and her brother Femi who flee to Britain from Nigeria. Their father is a political journalist who refuses to stop criticising the military rulers in Nigeria. Their mother is killed and they are sent to London, with their father promising to follow.

Abandoned at Victoria Station by the woman paid to bring them to England as her children, Sade and Femi find themselves alone in a new, often hostile, environment. Seen through the eyes of Sade, the novel explores what it means to be classified as 'illegal' and the difficulties which come with being a refugee

Illegal by Erin Colfer and Andrew Donkin

Twelve-year-old Ebo's terrifying story of travelling alone from his home in Africa in order to have the chance of a childhood, education and ultimately a safe way of life is brilliantly told in this graphic novel. In words and pictures, Eoin Colfer, Andrew Donkin and Giovanni Rigano tell how Ebo, along with so many others in the same plight, makes his way across the treacherous Sahara Desert before he even begins on the desperate journey across the sea. Told with great sympathy and warmth and propelled by Nobel Laureate Elis Wiesel's powerful quote, "You, who are so-called illegal aliens, must know that no human being is illegal", Ebo's story which is shared by millions of migrants, should be read by all.
